ight I take you back to at the meeting of the Literary Club on the evening of Friday, April 7, 1775, which we know from Boswell's *Life of Johnson* took place in a tavern amongst "numerous company"? After discussing Addison's supposed lack of grasp of Italian, the non-appearances of wolves in the poems of Ossian, the differences between the Irish and Erse languages, and the effect of singing the ballad of "*Lilliburlero*" on the Glorious Revolution, the conversation got around to the subject of Patriotism. In one of his most famous remarks, Johnson "suddenly uttered, in a strong determined tone," the statement: "Patriotism is the last refuge of a...
